Ribbon Cutting Brings History to Life for MK Betterment.

The Greate Egg Harbour Township Historical Society (GEHTHS) worked with original MK Betterment family members and the Egg Harbor Township Recreation Department to reopen a new MK Betterment facility for Township residents.

May 21, 2023. After a one day delay due to weather, the relatives of the founders of the MK Betterment Association joined the GEHTHS, the EHT Recreation department, and EHT residents under sunny skies to help cut the ribbon for the newly renovated MK Betterment building and grounds. It was an emotional event for the founder's relatives. The MK Betterment Association was started in 1963 by Atlas Lane who wanted to improve his local community.

With the help of his neighbors and friends, they built a meeting house, created a recreation area, and worked with the township for better roads, side walks, school bus stops and lights. The original building was used for civic, club and social meetings.

Programs and Responses

GEHTHS Partners with EHT History Research Project

Mary Ann Trail, Author of historical mysteries, is researching the history of Egg Harbor Township with plans to create a journal, write a novella and share her research through the GEHTHS speaker series.

The Greate Egg Harbour Township Historical Society and Mary Ann Trail have partnered to offer our residents a look into EHT during the 1800's. The research is being funded by Atlantic County Cultural & Heritage Affairs and Atlantic County.

Ms. Trail will act as the researcher and primary author of the documents describing the Township. The agreement is to provide a journal article and at least two lectures on her findings. Another outcome will be a historical romance novella set in EHT. The novella provides an opportunity to demonstrate fiction informed by the science of history and hopefully encourages a different audience to become interested in local history.

Lynn Wood, Historian for the Historical Society is also working on the project by providing local expertise and photographic documentation.

Research should be completed by December 2023 and final documents in the late Spring. Ms Trail's first lecture will be on accuracy in historical research.

GEHTHS Partners with DAR for USA Semiquincentennial

We are working together to recognize local patriots who fought in the America Revolution and are buried in the Zion Methodist Cemetery.

The Daughters of the America Revolution National Society's 250

Patriots Marker is a new effort to raise awareness of the Patriots who won America's independence.



The hope is to create a coast-tocoast network of markers, similar to the Madonna of the Trail statues dedicated in 1928 and 1929 to honor women whose courage and strength aided in conquering the wilderness.



The cemetery surrounding the Zion Church holds the remains of 11 Revolutionary War soldiers. The General Lafayette Chapter

of the DAR is honoring them by cleaning the grave markers. The GEHTHS is working on a historical marker to commemorate these American Heroes.

History Notes - Then & Now

Zion Methodist Church Started as the Blackman Meeting House

Many well-known EHT families contributed to building this church community.



The early Blackman Meeting House, a small cedar planked structure built circa 1764 on land belonging to Andrew Blackman, was used by Presbyterian worshipers until 1798 when Methodists began sharing the building.

A Methodist Society was formed October 23, 1814. The wooden meeting house soon became way too small for the growing congregation. Thomas Garwood and Japhet Ireland oversaw the building of a larger brick church and in 1822 the "Zion Methodist Episcopalian Church" was completed. The bricks were made by Samuel Somers. The bricks were laid in a lime mortar made from shells gathered from Lakes and Sculls Bays. All the shingles on the building were split and shaved, mostly by Thomas Garwood. Timothy Andrews was the master mason for the church. So in 1822, the Blackman Meeting House ceased to exist and the Zion Methodist Episcopalian Church was born. The cedar planks taken from the earlier meeting house were saved to build a shelter for the horses and oxen that brought worshipers to church in their wagons, sometimes from 20 miles away.

Renovations to the church were made throughout the years but the interior remains much the same as it did in the 1800s. A large brick addition was added behind the church in 1949. The cemetery contains ancestors of many early families in the area who contributed to this community church.
